Course Content:

This course provides an introduction to the Humanities by combining elements of Literature and Screen Studies. The course surveys a range of narrative forms, their functions and relationships to human society and culture. Australian and other narrative texts are used as examples. Topics to be addressed include the basic elements of narrative; how to analyse narratives; and fiction and non-fiction narratives. The course also provides an introduction to generic skills in the Humanities, including comprehending academic writing, summarising information, selecting and using reference material, using examples to support an argument and writing an essay. Other topics that may be included in the course are formal elements of literary and audiovisual narratives; relationships between narrative and history; semiotics; discourse analysis; myth.
