## **Unit Content:**

This unit complements BAHRS4033 Research Design, Management and Practice and is designed to be undertaken in conjunction along with either Honours Thesis 1 or Studio Project A. In a series of seminars scheduled across the semester, students will learn techniques in order to critically evaluate the relevant literature and scholarship in their field to write a Literature Review.
