Description of the Course:

This course focuses on emerging themes and issues central to contemporary visual culture, design and performance in Australia and internationally. While the emphasis will be on recent works and events, connections will be made to earlier epochs and seminal works as appropriate. Themes and issues addressed in this course may include: Nature, Identity, Body, Spirit, Politics, (de) Colonialism, Activism and Gender. Students are expected to visit galleries and events and attend talks, presentations and performances by artists, designers and performance makers.

Course Content:

This subject deals with contemporary trends in visual culture, design and performance that have impact and provide perspective on current local, national and international issues. In considering this, the course will place emerging movements in historical, political and social contexts that will not necessarily be chronologically based, but rather will explore how art, design and performance, in theory and in practice have and can express, interpret, challenge and change the world about us. Students will be expected to attend a range of events and exhibitions.

Topics may include:

- Visual Culture, Design, Performance and Technology
- Visual Culture, Design, Performance and the Body
- Visual Culture, Design, Performance and the Environment
- Visual Culture, Design, Performance and Text
- Visual Culture, Design, Performance and Global Culture
- Visual Culture, Design and Performance: (de) Colonialism and Indigenous perspectives
- Visual Culture, Design and Performance and the Audience
- Visual Culture, Design and Performance and Feminism
- Visual Culture, Design and Performance and Media
- Visual Culture, Design and Performance and Sound
- Visual Culture, Design and Performance and Activism.
