Description of the Course:

This course enables students to undertake independent research and the development of conceptual, technical and aesthetic skills and knowledge. The course encourages students practical artistic professional practice through supervision by and dialogue with staff, who are themselves practicing artists. Students will engage with models and opportunities to strengthen their respective professional expertise. By linking theory and practice, the course delivers a program of study tailored to their own personal artistic vision in order to produce a discernibly individual body of artworks within their chosen field. This course will engage students in practical and theoretical studies that will emphasise conceiving, planning, and executing a major program of works. This is achieved by taking into consideration theories that underpin contemporary artistic practice. The research element and learning will be supported by visits to art galleries/artists studios, talks, exhibition spaces.
