- Contested notions of community responsibility for caring for children
- Rural and regional trends in early childhood practice
- Understanding and accessing research and theory about birth order
- Understanding the purpose of observation/documentation
- Utilising systems for recording children's learning and development in the context of services
- Using learning stories as accessible records of children's cognitive, social and emotional growth
- Recognising abuse and neglect of children
- Communicating with families, children and other professionals
