Description of the Course:

This first midwifery practice course will provide the foundation knowledge required by midwifery students to effectively care for women during preconception through to early parenting. The focus will be on the role of the midwife as a primary carer in relation to: the preparation of women for pregnancy; physiological and psychological adaptation of women during pregnancy and birth, the first weeks after birth; and care of women and their babies during this continuum. Essential elements of effective woman-centred partnership, including evidence-based assessment frameworks, communication in assessment, strategies for decision making, problem solving and critical thinking for assessment practice, as well as basic psychomotor skills essential for health and pregnancy assessment will be explored. This course will explore pregnancy, childbirth, care of the mother and baby from the perspective of wellness through to variations of normal. Biomedical and midwifery concepts of childbearing will also be examined. Women-centred continuity of care and midwifery partnerships will be explored in the context of the midwifes professional responsibilities, scope of practice and role as a member of the maternity multidisciplinary team.

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Learning Task and Assessment:

A 30 credit point course will involve a minimum of 300 hours of learning. For every one hour of teacher directed learning there will be a minimum of two hours of student/learner directed learning. The *Teacher-directed* hours of student learning in this course will be experienced primarily through teaching innovations such as interactive technology enhanced lectures, class discussions, audio-visual presentations, flexible blended and on-line learning, low and high fidelity simulations, exploration of case studies and inquiry-based learning. Active participation is encouraged during class sessions. Attendance at all clinical placement hours and classes is compulsory.

Learner-directed hours will include focused self-directed learning activities, simulated laboratory learning, practice and reflection on practice, and role modelling. Students are expected to access electronic research databases and use computers to facilitate learning.
