Description of the Course :

This course consolidates midwifery knowledge, skills and application for practice in a variety of diverse settings in which midwives provide care to a range of vulnerable populations in primary health care contexts. The central focus is the diverse role of midwifery practice in providing maternity care in various healthcare contexts including regional, local, national and international contexts. The role of midwifery and maternity care in improving perinatal outcomes for disadvantaged women and families will be discussed and debated including issues of cultural diversity, refugees, and vulnerable populations. The midwives role as a member of a multidisciplinary team is also explored. This course works to put into context for the student, the nature and scope of midwifery practice and the importance of woman centred care and places it as central to securing improved maternal and infant health outcomes.

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Learning Task and Assessment:

A 15 credit point course will involve a minimum of 150 hours of learning. For every one hour of teacher directed learning there will be a minimum of two hours of student/learner directed learning. The *Teacher-directed* hours of student learning in this course will be experienced primarily through teaching innovations such as interactive technology enhanced lectures, class discussions, audiovisual presentations, flexible blended and on-line learning, low and high fidelity simulations, exploration of case studies and inquiry-based learning. Active participation is encouraged during class sessions. Attendance at all clinical placement hours and classes is compulsory.

Learner-directed hours will include focused self-directed learning activities, simulated laboratory learning, practice and reflection on practice, and role modelling. Students are expected to access electronic research databases and use computers to facilitate learning.
