This course will consider current or topical issues in psychology and/or contemporary society, and examine them from a psychological perspective, including, for example, current theory, the reserach knowledge base, and the relevance of historical precendents to current practice. Example topics may include cultural competence, Indigenous Australia, or current theory and practice in organisational, gay and lesbian psychology, biological and/or political psychology. Topics may change from year to year.
