Description of the Course:

This course takes a biopsychosocial perspective with an emphasis on psychopathology, social roles, cultural influences, and life points of potential crises. The course will build on previously acquired knowledge regarding physical, developmental, and emotional stages and provide an understanding of the biopsychosocial challenges at each stage across the lifespan. The knowledge gained will provide a basis on which students will develop evidence-based intervention plans.

Course Content:

This course prepares students for psychological practice with clients across the lifespan. The course covers the following areas:

Topics may include:

- Introduction of key diagnostic classification systems
- Identification and understanding of key psychological disorders
- Identification of key life points, influences, and potential crisis points
- Application of assessment tools and intervention across the lifespan
- Evidence-based interventions appropriate to specific stages across the lifespan

Values:

- **V2.** Awareness of own bias/limitations with regard to professional and ethical practice
- **V3.** Recognition of the need to monitor own values and reactions during the course of psychological practice
