Description of the Course :

This course focuses on Australian sport policy and the ways in which it impacts on the structure and operation of sport organisations. It does this by exploring the history and evolution of Australian sport policy from the 1920s to the current day, which sets the foundation for an examination and understanding of contemporary sport policy at the national and state levels. Specifically, the course analyses the formulation, development and implementation of sport policies in the areas of elite performance, participation, junior development, drugs, betting, broadcasting, member protection, and discrimination and harassment.
