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Course Content:

This intermediate Screen Studies course examines a range of film-making approaches that developed alongside the forms popularised by the American film industry. Using European art cinema as a point of departure, the course examines screen texts that deviate from the Hollywood style. These films appeared outside Hollywood in contexts such as artistic movements, national cinemas and independent production settings. The screen texts in this course offer alternatives to American studio filmmaking in terms of such elements as narration, editing, cinematography, mise-en-scène, staging and subject matter. The course includes early and recent screen examples. Beginning with a brief introduction to characteristics of classical Hollywood narration, the course examines a wide range of alternatives, including examples from various countries and periods, a range of formal and stylistic approaches and various ideological orientations. A detailed weekly schedule and text list will be provided at the beginning of the teaching period.
