Description of the Course :

Students undertaking this course are provided an opportunity to explore the problems and threats to animal species in the human environment. A series of case studies allow the students to analyse issues raised by agricultural production techniques, the management of pet species, and the significant stress on natural animal populations due to human impacts including climate change and habitat destruction. Students will explore examples of topical issues for a range of animal species and try to develop possible solutions. Students will carry out research and analysis for each of the case studies and present their findings in seminars to their peers and lecturers. Success in the subject will depend on the student's ability to work in groups and individually.
